9. What is the "input plus one" hypothesis?

10. The literature of language testing refers to a test's validity and reliability. What do these terms mean?

11. Which came first in language teaching, the communicative approach or the direct method?

12. In the study of phonology, what is assimilation?

Note these questions only touch on *some* of the issues we will be dealing with on the course. But if you do find the information, you'll be able to say "Hey, I read something about that somewhere!" when we come to that part of the course.
